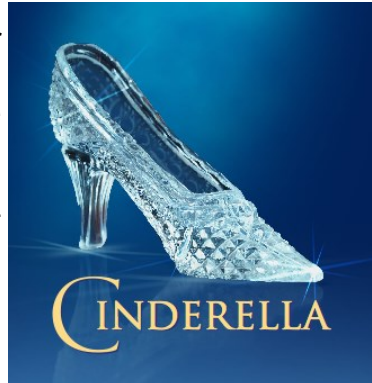

GENERAL RULES

1. This show will comply in every respect with the requirements and objectives for a Standard Flower Show as established by National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC).
2. This Schedule is the Law of the Show.
3. The 2007 edition of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. **Handbook for Flower Shows (HB)**, with corrections and updates is the authority.
4. National Garden Clubs, Inc. Standard System of Awarding will be used. **(HB pg. 5)**. Top Awards will be awarded, if merited. Judges' decisions are final.
5. **Horticulture Division** is open to all gardeners.
6. **Design Division** is open to members of National Garden Clubs, Inc. (Exception: Classes 16 & 17 are open to NGB staff and volunteers)
7. **Special Exhibits Division**
 - Section A. Educational** - open to NGC members and invitees
 - Section B. Photography** - open to Naples Garden Club members only
8. Emphasis is on fresh plant material. No artificial plant materials are permitted. For policy regarding use of invasive plants and those on the conservation list, see pg. 9 # 7 of this schedule.
9. All entries must be the work of one exhibitor unless otherwise stated.
10. Due care will be taken but neither Naples Garden Club nor Naples Botanical Garden will be responsible for either damage to or loss of property.
11. Properties should be marked with exhibitor's name.
12. Dates/times for accepting and removing exhibits are stated on page 2. Exhibits may not be removed until 5 p.m. Saturday. All exhibits not removed at that time will be removed and disposed of by the committee. Entry cards, photographs and ribbons will be retained in the club's office for two weeks.
13. The Flower Show Chair will be available and on premises at all times during the show. The Classification Chairs and the Judges Chair will be available and on premises during the judging.

RULES

1. Horticulture specimens must be fresh plant materials grown by exhibitor.
2. Entries must be ‘show quality’, well groomed & in suitable clean containers. Treated (oiled, dressed, etc.) specimens will be disqualified (*HB* pg.99).
3. All specimens must be correctly labeled with botanical names (Genus/species) or currently accepted scientific identification or trademarked™ or registered name ® to be eligible for a Top Exhibitor Award (*HB* pgs. 95-97). If the plant is a hybrid, the cultivar or variety name should be added. Common names may also be given, but are not sufficient to win a Top Exhibitor Award.
4. Exhibitor may submit more than one entry per class or sub-class, if each is a different genus, species, variety, cultivar, type, form, size or color.
5. Cut specimens of annuals, perennials & biennials must have been in exhibitor’s possession from seeds, cuttings or immature plants and grown to maturity. Bulbous plants must have been in exhibitor’s possession from planting or for at least 90 days. Container grown plants must have been in exhibitor’s possession at least 90 days, except for combination plantings, which must have been in exhibitor’s possession and growing together at least six weeks. Orchids must have been grown by exhibitor for at least 90 days (*HB* pg. 103).
6. Exhibits of self-multiplying and other multiple plants are permitted.
7. Plants on threatened or endangered lists (*virtualherbarium.org/EPAC*) must have been grown by the exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner. Exhibition of invasive plants (*fleppc.org*) is not permitted.
8. Entry cards are available in the Club office and should be completed in pencil in advance.
9. Pots may be of any size. Please preregister exceptionally large or heavy specimens and Collections & Displays with Lindsey Clark by March 15.
10. Clear glass containers will be furnished for most cut specimens. Exhibitors must supply clear glass container or alternative staging (e.g. kenzans) for exceptionally large or heavy cut specimens.
11. Cut specimens should not have foliage below water line.
12. Double potting is permitted as long as the inner container is not visible.
13. Top dressing with live plant material (e.g. moss) is not permitted.
14. Containers with distracting patterns or colors are not permitted.
15. The Classification Chair must approve all entries and has authority to combine or subdivide sections and classes and to disqualify entries that do not conform to schedule requirements or are of inferior quality.

TOP HORTICULTURE DIVISION AWARDS

The following **NATIONAL GARDEN CLUB TOP AWARDS** may be awarded if merited to blue ribbon winners scoring 95 or above. No section may be eligible for more than one sectional Top Exhibitor Award. See the *Handbook for Flower Shows* pgs. 43-44 for specific requirements.

Award of Horticultural Excellence (1) *Green, orange, blue rosette*

Award for highest scoring exhibit in the Horticulture Division.

Award of Merit for cut non-arboreal specimens (5)

Sections A, B, C, D, H

Orange rosette

Exhibits within a section must be judged by same scale of points.

Arboreal Award (2) *Two shades of green rosette*

Sections F, G

Section award for cut trees and/or shrubs.

Grower's Choice Award (3) *Dark green rosette*

Collectors Showcase Award (2) *Brown, green rosette*

THE NGC STANDARD SYSTEM OF AWARDING WILL BE USED

- ◆ Only one first place (blue), one second place (red) and one third place (yellow) may be awarded in each class/subclass. Honorable mention (white) may be given to other meritorious exhibits.
- ◆ First place must score 90 or more, second place 85 or more, third place 80 or more and honorable mention 75 or more.
- ◆ Most horticultural exhibits are judged by the following scale of points:

Cultural Perfection (show quality)	60 points
Conditioning, Grooming, Staging (clean, no debris)	25 points
Distinction (perfection of the specimen)	10 points
Plant identification (correct botanical name)	5 points

RULES

1. Only members of National Garden Clubs, Inc. may enter the Design Division by preregistering with Entries Chair Polly Galliker pgalliker@comcast.net (Exception: Classes 16 & 17 are open to Naples Botanical Garden staff & volunteers).
2. An exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired, but only one exhibit per class.
3. Some plant material must be used in every exhibit.
4. Fresh plant material **may never be treated**.
5. Designs must be the work of one individual and that name must appear on the entry card.
6. Designer's choice of design type unless otherwise noted in schedule.
7. Designs will be judged from at least 3 feet in center-front, unless otherwise noted in schedule.
8. Artificial flowers, foliage, fruit or vegetables are not permitted, nor are living members of the Animal Kingdom.
9. Taxidermy is not permitted, but items that simulate animals or birds and are manufactured or crafted as toys or decorative items are allowed.
10. Committee supplied staging may not be painted, papered or modified in any permanent way.
11. Religious symbols must be displayed in a respectful manner and in accordance with policies of local religious organizations.
12. The official American flag and other national flags are not permitted in any design. The use of any official national flag as an underlay, background, skirting, draping, etc. is also prohibited.
13. Neither landscapes nor scenes are permitted in the Design Division.
14. Plants on state conservation/native plant list may be used if grown by the exhibitor or legally obtained.
15. Accessories and featured objects may be used.
16. Plant materials used must be neatly and correctly listed on 3"x 5" cards (2 copies). Designer's name and class must be listed on the reverse of the cards.
17. If unable to fulfill the commitment, designer must provide a replacement.
18. The Classification Chairs must approve and sign off on exhibits for conformance before the exhibitor leaves the exhibition space.
19. Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their designs in good condition for the duration of the show.
20. Judges are requested to provide written comments on all designs.

10. All ribbon winners will be placed on the NGC website as room permits.
11. Photographs will be judged by professional photographers.
12. NGC & NGB are not responsible for damage and/or loss of photos. It is the exhibitor’s responsibility to remove the photo upon completion of the Flower Show on March 25, 2017, at 5:00 p.m.

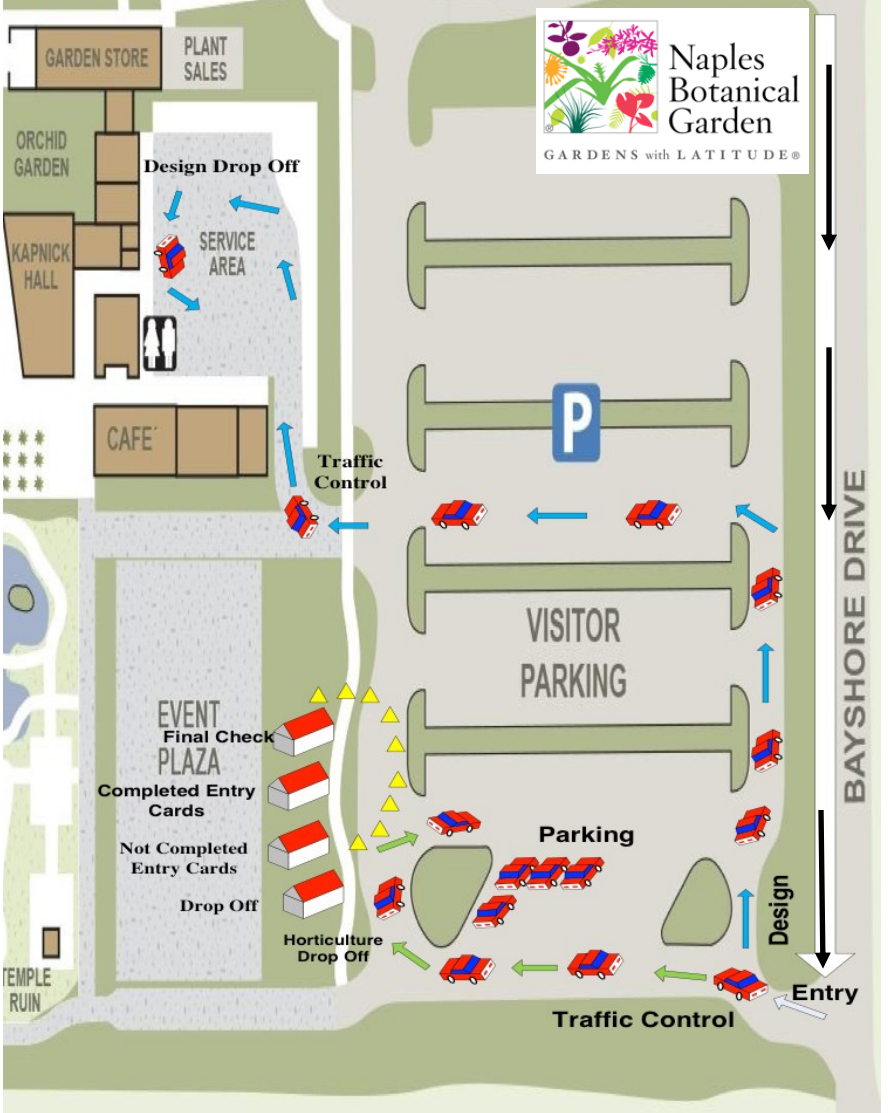
